Dear Probation Directors and Commissioners:

Attached please find the latest arrest reports from DCJS' Office of Justice Research and Performance. These reports provide useful arrest data regarding probationers for each individual jurisdiction, state-wide, and NYC/rest of state for your review and consideration.

The **Probationer Felony Re-Arrest Rate – Cohort Recidivism** report has been updated through 2015 and posted on the DCJS website. The file has page breaks by county, and is bookmarked for your convenience. Some internet browsers may not display the bookmarks, however, saving the file to your PC will provide access to the bookmarks.

Statewide, probationer arrests declined 13.1% to 11.6% for one year; 20.6% to 18.4% for two years; and 25.7% to 23.8% for three years following sentence-- between 2005 and 2014.

Probationers are examined as a group, based on year of sentence in a New York State court. Interim supervision cases are excluded. The same group of probationers is followed for one, two and three years. The report may be accessed through the following link:

The **Parolee and Probationer Arrest/Percent of Total Arrest Within County report for 2006 - 2015** has been updated. The file has page breaks by county, and is bookmarked for your convenience.

Statewide, probationer felony arrests declined 27.8%, probationer misdemeanor arrests declined 25.2%, and total probationer arrests declined 26.2%-- as a percent of total statewide arrests between 2006 and 2015

Data presented is based on:

- County of supervision (Supervision ORI). Jurisdiction ORI was used only when Supervision ORI was not present in the parole/probation record.
- Felony arrest events, not a unique number of parolees/probationers arrested (e.g., one parolee/probationer may have multiple arrest events); and
- Parolees under supervision and probationers under supervision for felony and/or misdemeanor offenses are included. Interim probation supervision and federal probation cases are excluded.
